WCID NO. 17 TO ASSESS DROUGHT FEE DURING WATER SHORTAGES

The WCID No. 17 Board of Directors approved the assessment of a drought fee when the local area is in moderate, severe and critical stages of drought. The move is in conjunction with the approved Fiscal Year 2025 Operating Budget and was recommended by experts as part of the District's 2024 water rate study.



While WCID No. 17 is currently in Stage 1 water restrictions, the fee would not be imposed until conditions on the Highland Lakes result in moving to Stage 2 or greater under the District's Drought Contingency Plan.

WCID No. 17 CEO & General Manager Jason Homan explained the rationale behind the fee saying, "While water restrictions are essential for conserving our most precious resource during times of drought, they also significantly reduce the utility's revenue. Our customers may not be aware but a majority of the District's operating costs are fixed, regardless of water sales. To ensure we can continue delivering safe and reliable drinking water, we must implement drought fees during these periods."

STAGE 1 WATER RESTRICTIONS IN EFFECT



WCID No. 17 remains in Stage 1 Water Restrictions as the combined storage of Lake Travis and Lake Buchanan is at 1,034,846. In Stage 1, twice per week watering is allowed, although most grass is dormant in the late fall and winter months so watering is probably not necessary at this time. We remind community members to practice conservation as the District will move to Stage 2 if the combined storage falls below 900,000 acre-feet, per our Drought Contingency Plan.
